Administration and Board of Education

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ACADEMICS

Our district's academic program provides opportunities for all students to reach their full potential.

Once again, the students of the Anthony Wayne Local schools excelled on the Ohio State assessments.

- Approximately 65% of all student state tests taken were at the accelerated, advanced, or advanced plus level.
- 87.5% of the 3rd grade students passed the reading assessment and all students achieved the 3rd grade reading guarantee promotion criteria.
- Approximately 95.8% of high school students graduated in 4-years
- The Class of 2018 was offered over \$11.8 million in scholarships and grants.
- Anthony Wayne Local Schools has a large number of graduates receiving college/post-secondary scholarships for the past three years :
 - **2018** - The 374 graduates of the Class of 2018 indicated the following future plans: 288 students will be attending a four-year institution, 38 will be enrolling in a two-year or professional school or an apprenticeship program, and 19 students will be entering our nation's armed forces.
 - **2017** - The 350 graduates of the Class of 2017 indicated the following future plans: 272 students will be attending a four-year institution, 26 will be enrolling in a two-year or professional school or an apprenticeship program, and 19 students will be entering our nation's armed forces.
 - **2016** - The 315 graduates of the Class of 2016 indicated the following future plans: 256 students will be attending a four-year institution, 29 will be enrolling in a two-year or professional school or an apprenticeship program, and fifteen students will be entering our nation's armed forces

- Twenty-eight vocational programs are offered by our vocational affiliate, Penta Career Center
- There are 766 students studying a Foreign Language at the high school
- Anthony Wayne offers 14 Advanced Placement courses.
- Anthony Wayne Local Schools offers a number of dual-credit opportunities for our students: For the 2018/19 school year we will be offering dual credit opportunities which include Introduction to Art, Introduction to Academic Writing, Intermediate French I, Intermediate French II, Intermediate German I, Intermediate German II, Intermediate Spanish I, and Intermediate Spanish II.

- Seven AWHHS students for attended the Students In Action Fall Leadership Conference.
- Numerous AW teachers and staff applied for and were awarded grants totaling over \$6,300 to provide outstanding educational opportunities from the Anthony Wayne Education Foundation.
- AWLS teachers Mr. Pransky, Mrs. Buffy, & Mrs. Pfefferle received First Energy Grant Award totaling \$2800 for STEM in the classroom!
- Anthony Wayne is leading and innovating in the area of Educational Technology. We are partners in a Straight A grant which allows AWLS teachers to work with other area educators to create a digital repository of content, resources, lessons, activities, and assessments for several high school, and junior high courses.
- AWJH participated in various anti-bullying activities with our students to promote students being an “upstander” and taking a stand against bullying. Students were encouraged to “Say Something” to a trusted adult if they witness someone being bullied. The counselors also hosted student lunch groups to discuss topics such as friendship and academic success.
- AWJH presented our annual “JBN Day” for students. JBN stands for “Just Be Nice” and that theme will resonated throughout the programming for the day.
- Six students proudly represented the junior high at the Lucas County Area Spelling Bee. These students competed against over 70 other students from many different schools around our county. Finalists: Elder Leedy, Hayden Johnson, Savannah Banks, Grace Hires, Katelyn Currens, Danielle Kistner, Maxwell Tate; Runner-up: Savannah Banks Winner: Grace Hires
- 7th grader Shelby Tupciauskas received a top seven Honorable Finalist award in for the *Ohio's Letters About Literature*. There were over 1200 JH entries in this contest.
- Eighth graders participated in Shadow Day by shadowing someone in the community during their workday. On the same day seventh graders took part in career day at the JH. Parents and local business associates came to the Junior High and taught the students about their professions and job responsibilities.
- AWLS and AWAKE teamed up to provide students with guest speaker Bruce Gradkowski. Mr. Gradkowski was a standout collegiate athlete who was drafted into the NFL. His presentation was geared toward student personal growth. Specifically, Mr. Gradkowski focused on pursuing one's passion, setting goals, self-control, giving back to your community, and accepting the differences in others. In the days that led up to the presentation, students were given reflective prompts that encourage deeper self-knowledge.
- In December, the FTMS local Spelling Bee was conducted. While 4 students moved on to the county level, 1 student represented FT at the regional level after moving on from the county spelling bee.



- FT held quarterly Honor Roll and Improvement Roll celebrations. Also, an end-of-the-year special Honors Breakfast was held for our top academic students and their parents.
- Internet safety lessons and child abuse prevention lessons were provided by FTMS school counselors.
- The 5th grade held an Entrepreneur Fair in May, where students learned how to make and market products.
- 6th grade math students competed in the Math League on February 28. In our 14-county region, FT placed in the top 5.
- The 5th grade students had a great experience at the Planetarium in March.
- The 5th grade students also had a Space Day on March 29th that was engaging, informational, and included parent volunteers.
- 6th grade students attended Outdoor Education at Camp Michindoh. Students spent a week learning more about science, teamwork, outdoor skills, and goal setting.
- The high school National Honor Society had approximately 30 students tutor FT students after school once each week.
- The three AW primaries received a donation from MAPS, WPA, and WPC (the parent clubs from each of the three buildings) to help fund Jim Basketball Jones, a motivational and anti-bullying speaker. There was a daytime program for students, as well as an evening program for families.
- The three AW primaries received a donation from AWAKE for t-shirts that support Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) and Red Ribbon Week. Every student and staff member received a shirt.
- The three AW primaries (grades 3 & 4 students) were presented a drug awareness lesson during Red Ribbon Week by a Village of Whitehouse patrolman.
- The three AW primaries received a donation of dictionaries from the Waterville Rotary Club for each third grade student.
- Monclova Primary has PBIS and Character Education Programs focused around the “General” Expectations of Respect, Responsibility, and Safety.
- Monclova Primary’s school therapy dog “Laney” completed her first full year of school at Monclova. Each day she “works” by assisting the staff of Monclova to promote and enhance the academic, personal, and social needs of the students.
- The Ohio Department of Education selected Waterville Primary School as a 2018 Purple Star designee for their commitment to serving military students and families in Waterville.



- Waterville Primary students participated in Camp Invention, Waterville Library's Summer Reading Program, as well as the Summer Accelerated Reader program.
- Sara, the Waterville Primary therapy dog, is being used daily to teach curriculum and reinforce Positive Behavior Intervention Supports Programming.
- Waterville Primary secured AWEF Grants for Zoo Programming, Leveled Literacy Books, and STEM classroom materials.
- Waterville Primary secured grants to fund school additional school wide STEAM curricular resources through First Energy and the NASA/Ohio Space Consortium.
- Waterville Primary spent a week celebrating literacy, career exploration, and making healthy choices. Our theme for the week was Bright Future Ahead! We focused on how positive choices and literacy will lead us to success and the achievement of long term future goals. Waterville Primary ended the week with a school wide Career Day, partnering with over 31 individuals representing the various career clusters.
- Waterville Students began a choice based art curriculum called Teaching for Artistic Behaviors
- The Whitehouse Primary learning community participated actively in PBIS. Students are taught behavioral expectations in a positive manner. Students are also recognized for doing a great job following expectations in the building. Students are recognized for their efforts each month. Quarterly assemblies are held and parents are invited into school to celebrate students' success.
- Whitehouse Primary is a Title One building. They have a team of title one staff members who supplement the instruction taking place in the classroom and support our struggling students with additional academic support.
- Whitehouse staff members volunteered to host before and after school groups to provide enrichment opportunities for our students. Book Club, Sign Language Club and Technology Club have provided additional opportunities for students in e recent school years.
- Whitehouse Primary has a long-standing partnership with Zion Church to provide a tutoring assistance program called TAP for Whitehouse students.
- Whitehouse 3rd graders visited Whitehouse Village Hall, the Whitehouse Fire Department, the Whitehouse Library, the Whitehouse Police Station, and other local area businesses to learn about their local community. Whitehouse 3rd graders also invited local businesses into school to learn about the local community, community businesses, and career opportunities.
- There are over 5500 computing devices in our District, specifically, Apple iPads, Apple iMacs, Google Chromebooks, Apple MacBook Air, and Apple MacBook Pro laptops. Some of these devices are available to be signed out of our media centers by classroom faculty. Computer labs are available for technology-specific tasks such as video editing or computer assisted design, and additional device carts have been assigned to specific faculty. Nearly all computer labs in the Anthony Wayne Local School District were recently updated with state-of-the-art Apple iMac, all-in-one computers.



- Classroom-assigned carts of devices have been chosen and assigned to faculty after a detailed needs assessment that determined which device is most age appropriate for the student, and which type of device best fits the curriculum and instructional design requirements of the faculty member. Ongoing assessment of educational technology needs will continue in an effort to enhance the instructional environment for both faculty and students.
- Each classroom is configured so that instructors can project their computer display and interact with that content for the purpose of enhancing instruction. SmartBoards, LCD televisions with Apple TVs, and LCD projectors are just some of the classroom display solutions in use in our schools. All instructional areas in the District contain at least one dedicated wireless access point providing maximum bandwidth for accessing the data network and internet to any computing devices located in those areas.
- In partnership with Bowling Green State University's college of education, Anthony Wayne hosts an annual teaching and learning conference, CREATE!, that attracts hundreds of educators from all over Ohio, Indiana and Michigan. The main purpose of the CREATE! conference is to assist faculty with the integration of creativity and technology into their classroom instruction.

- The Close Harmony vocal jazz choir performed Singing Telegrams for students and staff on Valentine's Day!

- AWHs presented “Peter & the Starcatcher” and “Little Shop of Horrors”
- Three AWHs students were selected for the American Choral Directors Association Central/ North Central Regional Honor Choir. Our students represented not only Anthony Wayne, but the state of Ohio when they traveled to Chicago to perform with students from a ten state area.
- Both vocal jazz choirs traveled to Western Michigan University to perform in the Gold Company Vocal Jazz Invitational. Close Harmony and Generally Jazz attended a concert by New York Voices and enjoyed an entire day of sharing performances with high school and college vocal jazz groups. Individual members of the NY Voices worked with our choirs following their performances.
- The Concert Choir was the only choir invited to perform with opera singer, Kristy Swann as part of the Toledo Opera premiere performance of I Dream, a new rhythm and blues opera. The choir performed at the Toledo Lucas County Library and the performance was aired live on WGTE radio.
- Several Anthony Wayne High School Choir students attended the University of Toledo High School Honor Choir. Dr. Brad Pierson, UT choral director conducted the choir which was composed of students from 25 high schools. Nationally renowned composer, Ola Gjello attended the event in which several of his compositions were performed.
- The AW Concert Choir performed the Anthony Wayne Alma Mater and Dave Riley’s A Celtic Blessing at the 2018 Commencement Ceremony.
- AWJH 7th/8th grade choirs' presentation of Elf Jr involving approximately 200 students. The Musical was a huge success.
- AWJH 7th/8th grade choirs presented, in collaboration with the Fallen Timbers 6th grade choir, a Spring Concert featuring auditioned soloists from all three groups.
- AWJH's 8th grade choir competed in the OMEA District 1 Large Group Contest where they received a rating of Excellent.
- Three 8th grade one 7th grade choir members were nominated and selected to participate in the OMEA District 1 Honors Choir
- Four 8th grade choir members and two 7th grade choir members were nominated and selected to participate in the BGSU Middle School Honors Choir.

- HS art students had artwork exhibited at the Maumee Country Valley Day School show, Visions and Dreams




- Several hundred students invited family & friends to attend Bring a Guest to Art week at FTMS.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP AND ACTIVITIES

A well-rounded education includes a wide variety of opportunities.

- Anthony Wayne High School is a member of the Northern Lakes League and the Ohio High School Athletic Association.
- AWHs anticipates having approximately 800 student-athletes for the 2017-2018 school year. Based on obtainable data, this looks to be the highest number of student-athletes ever in the high school.
- AWHs currently offers 27 varsity sport programs consisting of 10 in the fall, 10 in the winter and 7 in the spring.



- AWHs Football had back to back playoff years. NLL Champions. Finished 9-1 on the year, with a perfect 7-0 NLL competitive record. Nick Schneider crowned NLL Player of the Year and selected 1st team All Ohio.
- AWHs Volleyball Team finished NLL runner-up and Jillian Grant was selected NLL Player of the Year.
- AWHs Baseball won the NLL Championship.
- Softball was the district champion and regional runner-up in the 2018 season. They finished one game away from going to State.
- The AW Girls Track Team was named NLL Champions for 3rd consecutive year.
- Abby Moser qualified for the OHSAA Girls Cross Country State Championship.
- AWHs Hockey won back to back Northwest Hockey Conference White Division Championship.
- Agnes Bahr represented AWHs at the OHSAA Swim State Championship for the 2nd consecutive year.
- Grace Ellis represented AWHs at the OHSAA Diving State Championship for the 2nd consecutive year.
- The AW Boys Soccer Team won their 6th consecutive District Championship. Zach Mowka was crowned NLL Player of the Year and selected 1st team All Ohio.



- AWHs Boys Basketball was named Sectional Champs and District runner-up.
- AWHs Girls Basketball Team won the Sectional Championship.
- Boys Lacrosse was named NLL Champions. This is the first NLL Championship in AWHs school history.



- Both the 7th and 8th grade football teams finished with a 7-0 season which resulted in league titles.
- The 7th grade volleyball team finished 12-3, and 5th in the league tournament and 8th grade volleyball team finished 13-2, and 5th in the league tournament.
- Girls cross country finished 3rd in the league and the boys cross country finished 6th in the league.



- The 7th grade boys basketball team finished 9-5, and WON the championship in the league and the 8th grade boys basketball team finished 10-4.
- AWJH Wrestling took 3rd in the league, and was 6-2 in league meets.



- The 7th grade girls basketball team finished 4-11 in regular season play and the 8th grade girls basketball team had a record of 13-2.
- The AWJH boys track team took 3rd in the league and the girls track team took 1st in the league, and sent 9 athletes to the state track meet. Those athletes came home with a tied for FIRST IN THE STATE!

- AWHs FFA chapter collaborated with Sunshine Communities by volunteering on the Maumee campus, sponsoring and volunteering for the Sunshine Walk, Run and Roll, and through the FFA Week "wear a hat for Sunshine" fundraiser.
- The Anthony Wayne FFA chapter had much success this year at Ohio FFA Convention including: 5 state degrees; a state FFA officer; two American Degrees; an Ohio proficiency winner; an Ohio star state candidate; 9 students placed in the top 3 of the Ohio agriscience fair; a student signed a letter of intent to teach agriculture after earning her degree at The Ohio State University; and three gold officer books.

- FT students get involved in many athletic, artistic, musical, and service groups throughout the community (ex. scouts, Jr. Generals, church groups, Children’s Theater, dance, and much more)

- As part of the 5th grade service project several of the 5th grade teams volunteered in the neighborhoods in September.
- FT welcomed employees of BASF several times throughout the year to present lesson to our 6th graders.



- Students at Waterville visited Waterville Fire Station, Toledo Art Museum, Valentine Theater, local Metroparks, The Toledo Zoo, Sauder Village, and took a walking tour of historic Waterville.
- Waterville teachers were recipients of such awards as: Sun Federal Credit Union Extraordinary Teacher of the Year and also the Ohio Lottery Teacher of the Month designations.

- Whitehouse students participate in quarterly community engagement projects. In the past few years, students have picked up litter around town, collected items to support hurricane relief in Texas and Florida, clothing items to donate to local charities, and have collected food to donate to our local food pantry.
- Whitehouse staff and students welcome 100s of volunteers annually to work with our students as tutors, room parents, and for special events.
- Whitehouse Primary student council members visit Whitehouse Country Manor throughout the school year to visit with the residents. Our student council also plays an active role in our building, volunteering to help with a number of events throughout the year.
- Whitehouse Primary has a growing relationship with CedarCreek Church in Whitehouse to provide support for students and families in a variety of ways.
- The Whitehouse staff has written grants to welcome the Toledo Zoo to the building, as well as Imagination Station. Additional grants have been written to explore flexible seating options for students, to supplement our building STEM program, and to gain additional technology for use in our classrooms. These organizations provide valuable hands-on experiences for our students.
- Whitehouse fourth grade students produce and sell Santa Slime to fellow students to learn about entrepreneurship. Profits from the sale are donated to the Zion Church to be used to help support local families in need during the holiday season.
- Whitehouse Primary actively participates in a building-wide PBIS program to positively reinforce student behavior. Each month students are recognized for being Generals at our school. Generals at our school are taught to be respectful, responsible and safe. Quarterly awards assemblies are held to recognize students.
- A variety of before and after school clubs are also available for Whitehouse students. Sign Language Club, Destination Imagination, Ensemble, Technology Club and Book Club have been offered.



- Health and wellness opportunities are also offered to our families on a regular basis. Adventures in Family Fitness are scheduled throughout the year. Parents are encouraged to come in with their children and participate in a variety of fitness related activities such as cardio drumming, fitness fun, martial arts, and yoga.




FISCAL STEWARDSHIP

Financial responsibility ensures that the majority of funding is spent on classroom instruction.

In Ohio, the funding of schools is shared between three main sources: Federal, State, and Local Funding. The Federal and State governments determine the amount of funding schools will receive each year based on what they determine to be adequate.

The AW School District, considered a high wealth district by the State, receives approximately 21% of our funding from the State compared to the State average of approximately 47.1%.



- The property tax rate paid by Anthony Wayne residents (40.89 mills) is the lowest of the eight schools in Lucas County along with our neighboring district Perrysburg Exempted Village School District.
- The AW School District continues to see some of the highest levels of student academic achievement while having some of the lowest costs in the area. The AW expenditure per pupil, as reported in the FY2017 District Profile Report from the Ohio Department of Education, is the lowest in Lucas County.



- AW is involved in several consortiums that assist in receiving services and reducing costs with other districts. For example, Ohio School Council, Metropolitan Education Council, Maumee Valley Operating Managers, and State Purchasing Cooperative of Vendor Contracts are just an examples of groups we work with to reduce expenditures.
 - The AW District works to influence state funding by ensuring legislators are aware of the impact state funding reductions will have on students, the community, and the district. The district also works with professional organizations to lobby legislators to provide a long-term solution to school funding.



PARENT & COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Educational experiences are enhanced by partnerships between the school district and community.

- The individual schools promote the AWSG Spaghetti Supper and create a basket to be used as a part of that organization's silent auction.
- Held the AW "Cut Out Cancer" event where they collected donations of hair to help make wigs for children with cancer.
- AW & Findlay Girls Soccer communities raised an incredible \$3342.26 for Hurricane Harvey relief
- AW FCCLA held a can food drive and donated food and money to local families in need.
- AWHs held "Volley for a Cure"
- Participated in the Race for the Cure.
- Collected over 10,000 pounds of donated household items and clothes for the Good Will "Pass It On" challenge.
- AWHs sponsored trick or treat for canned food drive. Students collected a record number of canned goods
- AWLS donated \$3831.59 to the Veterans Memorial Park
- AWHs students, parents, & staff supported Soles4Souls by donating shoes for a great cause.



- AWHs is collected "Coins for Cancer" from students! They reached their goal of over \$1200! 100% of the proceeds will go to the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society!



- AW faculty and staff raised money for the Veteran's Memorial Park in Whitehouse.
- AWHs Art Club students decorated cookies for donating to the Cookie Drop delivering to area service workers
- AWHs Art Club students decorated pumpkins to cheer up patients at the River Centre Clinic
- Junior High Student Council organized a food drive to donate to a local food bank
- JH Student Council sponsored a Valentines dance with \$1,693.25 raised to benefit the American Heart Association.
- JH Student Council held a Pasta for Pennies fundraiser. A total of \$3,016.29 was raised to support the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.
- AWJH Student Council held several fundraisers with the help of local businesses and community members; General's Ice Cream, Granite City, Cocina de Carlos and Chipotle, a percentage of sales went to Student Council. Student council donated funds to needy families during the holidays.
- JH Girl Scouts involved in Student Council organized a Victory Center Goods Drive. All items were donated to the Victory Center.
- Many AWJH faculty and staff made donations to great causes. Faculty donated to the A.W. Alumni Association for help funding additional student scholarships. The scholarships are for students interested in two-year programs at Owens, apprenticeships, nursing, trade schools, etc. and also for traditional four-year college students. Also donations for the United Way were collected.
- AWJH partnered with the Red Cross for a blood drive. According to a representative from the Red Cross, they "knocked it out of the park, coming in at **137% of their goal!**"
- AWJH collected supplies for those in need after Hurricane Harvey. The school community collected and donated supplies to ISO Impact / Impact with Hope in Waterville. Students filled (20) five gallon buckets and over 10 boxes with supplies in categories designated: feed a family, personal care, baby care, and clean up.
- BASF continued to be involved in FT with through class lessons, teacher science conference sponsorship, and more.
- FT Right to Read Week was celebrated with the theme "Reading Can Take You Anywhere" A career unity was tied into many activities that week.



- Life Skills lessons were presented with Amanda Crosby from AWAKE along with school counselors.
- The Fallen Timbers News is published monthly and sent out to all families to communicate important information and highlight building activities and accomplishments.
- The FT staff adopted a family in need during the holiday through collaboration with Zion United Methodist Church.
- The Student Council directed a “Stuff The Bus” food drive. FT students and families brought in over 11,000 items for the Food For Thought organization.
- Fallen Timbers welcomed in over 100 volunteers to work with our students and staff members tutoring and as teacher assistants for special events, etc.
- Monclova Primary has a multitude of parent and community volunteers who either assist during the school day or with special events and projects. These volunteers were thanked for their service at a Volunteer Appreciation Breakfast in April.
- Dr. Brody, a local optometrist, voluntarily completed classroom lessons at Monclova Primary, and a local dentist also completed classroom lessons and provided the students with toothbrushes and toothpaste.
- Monclova Primary partnered with the Waterville Branch of the Toledo Public Library to promote their Summer Reading Program.
- Monclova Primary partnered with the Monclova Community Center to create and fill an Angel Tree that provided holiday gifts for Monclova area students, families, and community residents in need.
- Monclova Primary received a grant from the Anthony Wayne Education Foundation that was used to help fund the classroom lessons provided by the Toledo Zoo.
- Monclova Primary hosted, helped organize, and provided volunteers for a community blood drive. In return, grade-level presentations of Pint-Sized Heroes were provided to the school.
- Monclova Primary formed the next chapter of Generals' Council. This group of student council members served as leaders and assisted with many school-wide functions and events.
- Monclova Primary sponsored many Wellness Committee activities for students and staff throughout the year.
- MAPS, the Monclova Area Parents, sponsored many special events for our students: Movie Night, Book Fair, Donuts for Dad & Muffins for Moms, Father/Daughter Dance & Mother/Son Event, Secret Santa, Last Day Blast, Family Fun Night, and Imagination Station.



- MAPS provided numerous donations for classroom supplies, school supplies for students, and technology equipment.
- Monclova 4th grade students completed an entrepreneurship unit, in which they produced and sold bookmarks to students throughout the school. The profits were donated to the “Make a Wish” Foundation, in honor of a Monclova family.
- Monclova Primary organized a food drive to stock the shelves of the Anthony Wayne Food Pantry in Whitehouse and donated over two pick-up trucks full of grocery and household items.
- In conjunction with the Monclova Community Center and a Monclova donor, Monclova Primary organized and distributed \$100 worth of groceries from Kroger to each of several area families in need.

- Monclova Primary hosted a 3-quarter drive to celebrate the 3rd birthday of our school therapy dog, Laney. The money collected was used for various therapy dog expenses. A portion of the proceeds was also donated back to Assistance Dogs for Achieving Independence, in order to assist other schools with the equipment/start-up fee that is required to receive a school therapy dog.
- Monclova students created dog-themed placements in art class to be used at the Assistance Dogs spaghetti fundraiser entitled "Pasta for Pooches." One placemat winner was chosen from each classroom by the staff at ADAI.
- Monclova 3rd graders organized a book drive during "Right to Read" Week in May. The books collected from the drive were donated to the Salvation Army.
- Monclova Kindergarteners created Valentine's Day treat bags for Addison Heights nursing home residents. Each student decorated a bag and filled it with candy and snacks.

- Waterville Primary partnered with Bowling Green State University to host our second Family Literacy Night: *Camp Out with a Good Book* for families of students in PK-4.
- At Waterville Primary over 100 community members are volunteering at Waterville Primary during special events and throughout the typical day.
- Waterville Primary fourth grade students performed at the annual American Red Cross Veterans Appreciation Breakfast and Resource Fair held at UT Savage Arena for hundreds of Veterans and their families.
- Waterville Primary received approximately \$30,000 in donations from the Waterville Parents Association for instructional materials, technology, and various miscellaneous gifts (PBIS school banners, author visit during Right to Read Week, etc).
- Kay & Paulus Orthodontics spoke with the children at Waterville Primary and taught lessons on good hygiene and dental health.
- Waterville staff participated in a Holiday Angel Tree, purchasing presents and food items for Waterville families in need.
- Waterville Primary Staff worked with American Heart Association for a Hoops for Heart donation drive as well as a Pint Sized Heroes blood drive.



- Waterville Land Lab donated fresh produce to the Anthony Wayne Food Ministry throughout the summer.
- Waterville teachers provided free tutoring for students through the Evolving Minds Youth Center.
- WPA ran programs for our students including Winter's Ball (father and daughter dance), Bowling for Boys (mothers and sons), Book Fair, Muffins for Moms, Doughnuts for Dads, and Spring Spectacular.
- Waterville Student Council held a joint meeting with Waterville City Council to discuss positive improvements for the community.
- Waterville Primary held a canned food and coat drive during the holidays for needy families.

- Whitehouse Parents' Club spends approximately \$30,000 dollars annually in support of the staff and students of Whitehouse Primary. Recent purchases include technology for classrooms, iPads for all staff, subscriptions to various educational websites, school assemblies, and annual allotments for every staff member to help supplement what is happening in each classroom.
- Whitehouse Parents' Club sponsors many events at school including mother-son dances, father-daughter dances, doughnuts for dads breakfasts, muffins for moms breakfasts, movie nights, field trips for each grade level, a community 5K event, right to read week activities, literacy night, dine out nights, meals for our staff, teacher appreciation week recognitions, an annual read-a-thon, as well as a carnival for our students.



STUDENT SERVICES

A variety of services provide options to ensure all students receive individualized instruction, enrichment and support.

- Anthony Wayne had 889 students identified as gifted in the district last year.
- Last year, 566 students received gifted services. This was an increase of over 100 students from last year.
- Our gifted programming continued to expand to work with a variety of students in grades 2-12.
- Anthony Wayne Local Schools contracts preschool services through the Educational Service Center of Lake Erie West to children ages 3 to 5 for roughly 103 students.
- Anthony Wayne Local Schools special education staff services 12.6% of our student population (including preschool)
- A multi-factored team representing Anthony Wayne Local Schools trained with OCALI and the Ohio Department of Education on the identification of Educational Autism.
- The Student Services Department trained all district staff members on American Disability Act (ADA) and 504 policies and procedures.
- Anthony Wayne Local Schools provides support to 2.2% of our student population requiring Section 504 plans.
- 2017 Ohio Special Education Annual Rating - Meet Requirements with no required actions. (highest level that is attainable)

- During the 2017-2018 school year, the Student Services Department provided continued training on the comprehensive and research based Strategic Instruction Model.
- Student Service Department is collaborating with community-based agencies to provide our students and families with additional supports.
- Anthony Wayne High School special education staff provide real world experiences for our students within the community.
- Anthony Wayne has a student drug-testing program implemented for students in grades 7-12 involved in athletics, extracurricular, and drive to school to provide another reason to say “no”.

The Vision of the Anthony Wayne Local Schools is to partner with the community to engage all students in educational opportunities empowering them to be active, responsible, and productive citizens in our global society. The district offers a wide range of programs and services to provide opportunities for students to become active in the community and to be successful upon graduation. Anthony Wayne staff continues to focus on the future to ensure we are a destination district for future generations.

The Anthony Wayne Local Schools (AWLS) community includes over 4,400 students and hundreds of teaching, administrative, and support staff, within 77 square miles; and serves Monclova Township, Waterville, Whitehouse, and several area townships. 
